Review of the National Framework for Prevocational Medical Training

Part 1 Consultation paper: Review and development work

The Australian Medical Council (AMC) is currently developing a two-year framework for prevocational (PGY1 and PGY2) medical training. This builds on the existing Framework for Internship. The point of general registration will remain at the end of PGY1. The review combines the following:

- 1. The review of the National Framework for Medical Internship, which in 2014 replaced state-based internship requirements and complemented new national registration requirements of the Medical Board of Australia.
- 2. The development of a two-year Capability and Performance Framework, Entrustable Professional Activities (EPAs) and specifications for an e-portfolio, on behalf of the previous Australian Health Ministers' Advisory Council (AHMAC). This work arose from Health Ministers' 2018 response to the 2015 Review of Medical Intern Training.


This consultation seeks feedback on the next phase of review and development work. This paper provides an overview of the review process. **Part 2: Consultation questions** provides a description of concepts for consultation and a template of questions for feedback.

Review process: Where is the review up to?

The AMC's review process will include multiple opportunities for stakeholders to engage. A summary of the review process, status and development work is provided below. A detailed timeline of the review is available on <u>the website</u>.



Phase 1: After scoping & evaluation, the AMC confirmed the <u>scope</u>. In 2020 the AMC commenced **Phase 2**, formally consulting on the first package of work in November. The AMC received over 50 written responses. Feedback was broadly supportive. The detailed feedback has been considered in the next phase of review and development work. **Transition and implementation:** The timeline has been revised, 2022 will be a year of transition and 2023 the start of implementation. A summary of the proposed revised two-year framework is provided below.

	5. <u>Term assessment form</u> - Revised version of current mid/end of term assessment for. First consultation on changes in 2021.
Training environment	1. <u>National standards for prevocational programs</u> - Draft revised document, concepts consulted on in 2020. Changes made to the standards.
	2. <u>Guidelines and requirements for programs and terms</u> - Draft revised document, concepts consulted on in 2020. Consulting on new draft parameters to replace mandatory term requirements.
Quality assurance	1. <u>Domains and procedures for AMC accreditation of prevocational accreditation</u> <u>authorities</u> - Concepts for change proposed. New for consultation in 2021.
E-portfolio specifications	1. <u>High-level specifications</u> – Draft document consulted on in 2020. Further detail added.

- <u>Formal six-week consultation:</u> Consultation documentation sent to key stakeholders requesting feedback.
- <u>Workshop sessions</u>: Small group (Zoom) workshops will be held with relevant and interested stakeholder groups.
- <u>Presentations to key stakeholder groups</u>: The AMC will continue to organise opportunities for presentation and discussion with key stakeholder groups.
- <u>Webinar</u>: The AMC will be holding and recording webinar session/s on the components for consultation.
