PERSONA DESCRIPTION

Azar, 43, female, married with children. Country of training – Iran, where she completed her medical degree and worked as a doctor – she has refugee status. Initially, on arrival in Australia, Azar worked in healthcare in data entry roles. This was frustrating and demoralising. Impacting her recency of practice are three issues: it took significant time to secure visas in Australia; she had gaps in her medical work experience due to pregnancies and she was unable to secure employment as she was not able to get all relevant documents for her medical training and work experience as a doctor prior to leaving Iran. She made contact with a mentor who recommended her for an Observership program which she excelled in. She then secured employment in a medical role in a rural setting after obtaining registration via the standard pathway.

She struggled with colloquial English, the culture and with supervision in a rural area – learning gaps in practice included cultural safety, communication, and understanding the health system. She was keen to leave her rural position because she encountered racism and exploitation particularly with unfair conditions which weren't comparable with those of other colleagues who had been in Australia for longer. Her reason for immigrating to Australia was to secure a better life for her children – she had worried about schooling her children in a rural setting and employment for her partner (who is an engineer but in a rural setting was a house father and struggled with his identity and culturally changing power dimensions in the family). She would like to see political consideration of document verification processes for international medical graduates who are refugees; streamlined recency of practice requirements, improved supervision, a better culture in medicine and streamlined pathways requiring less time and reduced financial burden.
